
TON UP FOR CHRISTMAS

Elsewhere in this edition, there is news on the brand new Members' Information Service we are launching, news of some additional rallies for 1994 and a short review of the year.




Andrew MacMorland's two Drummond mowers. Notice how both seem to have the same handles, giving a distinctive flow to the mowers' outlines.


Michael Duck's c1924-26 Qualcast Major push mower, one of the first models produced by the company. Michael hopes to bring the Major to the MK Rally in 1994.

Information Service

The Club is introducing a special information service for Members. The service will be co-ordinated through the Club, and will be run in conjunction with the Hall & Duck Collection, which has kindly agreed to charge just £3 per machine enquiry to Club Members rather than the normal charges of £6.50. This is a very generous discount and, as anyone who has used this service in the past will know, well worth it. However, to make sure that this special price is only available to Club Members we have had to impose some very basic rules:

- 1 All enquiries must be made either through the Club Secretary or the Club's normal address.
- 2 All enquiries are to be made on the correct forms, and a Membership number must be included (you will find this on your Membership Card).
- 3 The fee is £3 for Members in the UK and £3.50 for Members overseas (to cover additional postage costs). The fee for non-Members is £6.50 for non-Members.
- 4 A copy of the information obtained will also be held by the Club to help build up a database of material.
- 5 The Club will be able to publish any interesting material in Grassbox.

A single form is enclosed with this edition of Grassbox. Forms may be copied as often as required. If possible, a three-quarter view of the machine being queried should be enclosed with enquiries as this will help greatly with identification and general queries. *Robbie Robinson*.

Milton Keynes Museum




Hatfield House

In addition to his hard work organising the Club's Membership and other activities, Robbie runs the Banbury Steam Rally lawnmower section and is editor of Banbury Steam Society's Yardsheet newsletter

Andrew Grout, Committee Member

Andrew has been involved with the Old Lawnmower Club right from the start. He attended the very first lawnmower rally at Milton Keynes Museum in 1989, before the club was officially formed. Andrew has over 70 mowers and collects "anything" and "doesn't worry about the condition", although he tends to specialise in Ransomes. At the moment, Andrew's largest Ransomes is a 42" cut ride-on, from about 1920.

Take A Tip From Atco


In 1927 Charles H Pugh produced a booklet entitled 'The Finest Motor Mower on Earth', a rather ambitious title perhaps, given that the mower in question was the Standard. Nevertheless, many Standards have survived (according to Atco, by 1927 they had sold 14,000 of the model, and production continued for a couple more years after this). The book contained some handy month-by-month tips for Atco owners. The company's comments for December and January are still relevant to owners today.

December: 'Little can be done out of doors in December. Have the cutters of your Atco reground if necessary, the engine decarbonised, and the mower generally cleaned and adjusted.'

January: 'When the turf is frost-bound or very wet, keep off it as much as possible....If cutters have not been ground it is advisable to have this done now.'

Could it be that Atco knew 70 years ago what Old Lawnmower Club Members would be getting up to during the Winter?

Review of the Year

1993 was a transition year, and will go down in the Club's history as the year we really began to make a mark. Following the growth of the original 'free membership' club to over 150 Members, it became impractical for one person to run it part time. An inaugural meeting was held at Milton Keynes Museum in May, when it was decided to form a small working committee to handle the running of the Club, draft a constitution and to introduce a small membership fee.

The MK Museum Rally in May was the Club's most successful yet. The events at Hatfield House and Banbury in June were also the biggest in their short histories too.

During the Summer, the Club spent a great deal of time contacting all Members, collecting subscriptions and compiling a new Membership Directory This resulted in a consolidated Membership, starting from about 60 Members. but growing to just over 100 by the end of the year. This is no mean achievement for such a young Club

Throughout the year, many members were featured in local and national media. This publicity has helped the Club to grow and raised awareness of old lawnmower collecting

1994 will see more of the same, and the introduction of new events and services for Members.

List of Books, Articles and Papers on Old Lawn Mowers. List of Museums with Old Lawn Mowers on display. List of Recommended Suppliers.


