Thanks to everyone who has sent in information, photographs and articles. The more I receive, the more varied the newsletter can be, and the less work for me!





MORE ON ATCO

Following my recent article in Grassbox on the Atco Standard, I have been continuing my research. It would appear that all Atcos had Senspray carburettors before 1926.

On the subject of motor cycles and lawn mowers, most people have heard of Royal Enfield and Excelsior, but not many realise that Charles H Pugh owned Rudge-Whitworth and that C H Pugh's grandson (or great) was chief designer there during the racing successes in the 1930s. Rudge used the Senspray carburettor (another C H Pugh product) and Atco used Rudge Tradesman's Combinations at their depots.

Editor's Note: Martin Seymour also reckons that as late as 1929, some of the large 24" machines with the JAP 350cc engines also had Sensprays and not Amals. Incidentally, Martin is looking for clutch and cylinder head spares for such a machine. Call Martin on 01449 774207 (Stowmarket).

Robbie Robinson had arranged for each exhibitor to be given a ride on the footplate of a real steam locomotive, and most of us took advantage of this rare opportunity. Although there were not many visitors to the event, it was really great way to spend a weekend.

ANNUAL RALLY

There were more exhibitors and more mowers at this year's Annual Rally than ever before, making it our biggest ever rally. On Sunday afternoon, we reached 100 mowers on the Museum's lawn. These ranged in age from the 1860s through to the 1960s.

A considerable number of exhibitors came for the whole weekend, so even the Saturday was quite busy. In the afternoon, I gave a tour of the Museum to show the effects of the fire, and in the evening nine of us went for a drink and a meal in a local pub. I do not think they knew what had hit them in the pub, but it was a great evening!

Sunday was busy, and a steady stream of old and new friends arrived throughout the morning in time for the Club AGM at noon. By lunch time we had filled the Museum's lawn with mowers and decamped to the meeting room for the AGM.

One new idea this year was to award a prize, 'The Andrew Grout Trophy', for the mower that the exhibitors chose as the one they would most like to take home. Each Member attending the rally was able to choose their favourite mower, with the majority of votes going to three machines - an c1880s Shanks pony mower belonging to Stan Hardwick, a 1930s Dennis belonging to Roger Wilkinson, and an 1880s Archimedean belonging to Alan Hardwick. When all the votes had been counted, the Shanks pony mower emerged as winner, and Andrew Grout presented Stan with the Trophy, an engraved silver tray, and a souvenir engraved tankard. Stan will keep the Trophy for one year, but the tankard is his to keep.



In fact Stan had quite an eventful weekend. He set off from home in Filey very early on Saturday, and was one of the first to arrive at Milton Keynes. On the way the magneto cover on his 1921 Atco oval frame had fallen off, and been lost en route. By pure chance, John Barnard arrived with a similar mower to sell, but with a spare engine, so Stan was able to buy a new cover for a few pounds without having to 'split' another complete machine.

On the Sunday afternoon, I presented a number of exhibitors with a special souvenir to mark the 75th anniversary of Atco. The souvenir was a box of sweets in the shape of an Atco delivery lorry. The company was presenting these to visitors to the Chelsea Flower Show the following week, so the rally exhibitors were the first to receive them.

One thing that everyone said about this year's event was that the standard of the mowers, and the variety of models, was better than in previous years. I am sure that the standard rises because of the natural competitiveness that these sorts of event engender, and because people are refining their approach to the hobby all of the time.

It would be unfair to pick out particular stars of the show because there were so many. Besides, some people will find reasonably modern motor mowers at least as interesting as the oldest gear drive push mower. It is the variety of machines that makes the show what it is, and everyone seems to get along with each so well.

The only thing that spoilt the event, if spoil is the right word, was the weather. It was wet and windy for virtually the whole weekend, only really clearing up right at the end, when quite few people had gone home. One day we will have some sun at the Museum for the rally. In fact, some people can even remember the last year it was warm (1993 I think).

AGM REPORT

The AGM was attended by more than 30 Members of the Club on Sunday 19 May at Milton Keynes Museum.

Keith Wootton opened proceedings by welcoming everyone. In his report, Keith went through some of the highlights of the previous year and said he felt the Club had continued to be successful. He thanked everyone who had been to the events, contributed to Grassbox or helped by simply joining the Club.

Keith also thanked the Committee, particularly Robbie Robinson who, with Keith, undertakes most of the day to day running of the Club.

In his Secretary's Report, Robbie Robinson said that there were now well over 200 Members and that the majority had rejoined from the previous year. He also reported that the Club now had a number of Members overseas, and that he thought this was a good sign for the future of the Club.

Martin Stephenson was unable to attend the AGM, but his Treasurer's Report was made instead by Keith Wootton. Income in the year to 30 April was £1636.16 and expenditure was £1477.89, a surplus of £158.27. This left £1227.13 in the bank, some of which was already committed for specific projects. The remainder will be used to develop new services and facilities for Club Members.

There were no proposals to raise the Membership fee for the foreseeable future.

Keith, Robbie and Martin were re-elected to their positions for a further year. The existing committee Members, Andrew Grout, John Barnard and Alec Hillyar all offered to stand again and were re-elected. Two additional committee Members were also elected, these being Tim Durant and Les Harrison.

The meeting was completed in approximately 30 minutes.

INSURANCE

A number of Club Members who are perhaps new to rallying have asked about the type of insurance that many event organisers require exhibitors to hold.

Virtually all events insist that exhibitors have what is known as Third Party Public Liability Insurance. Basically, this is required in case someone else (ie a Third Party) is injured or property damaged as a result of the use of the mower (it's similar to third party car insurance). The idea is that if an accident does occur, the person injured or the owner of damaged property can be compensated by the insurance. Many events now ask for a minimum cover of £1,000,000 for third party liability.

There are various ways of obtaining cover. It can be added to household insurance, but this can be expensive. It is also worth bearing in mind that household insurers are not experts when it comes to mowers and rallies, and may not understand what they are covering, which might cause a problem if the worst should happen. Some Members have rally insurance as part of the membership fee of their local tractor or engine club, which is a good system and generally inexpensive. Others prefer to use one of the specialist insurers, such as David Franklin or North Cotswold Insurance. These offer sufficient cover for a small annual fee. They generally cover all machines in a collection, but limit the number that can be taken to a rally. This means that you can insure your entire collection, and then take which ones you like to an event without having to make special arrangements for each event.

EXHIBIT LOG SHEETS



Aldham Old Tyme Rally, 8/9 June

The 20th Aldham Old Tyme Rally was held at its usual venue near Colchester, Essex. One of the new Club banners announced the participation of several Club members, including Tony Houghton, Andrew MacMorland, Crawford Stirling, and Chris Thompson. Tony had brought along three reciprocating knife mowers, Crawford an early Allen Scythe, Andrew an early Ransomes pushed by an MP and a Shanks Jehu, whilst Chris had a 1928 Automower. Best mower of the Show was won by Club Member Mrs J Austin of Ipswich with her 1875 Ransomes, Sims and Head 8" Automaton, a really rare and original machine.
